Along with our Open House Saturdays, the Blacksmith Shop welcomed visitors during two (2) Dover Borough Recreation Sundae's In the Park gatherings. On Saturday, June 29th, the Blacksmith Shop participated in Dover's Civil War Remembrance Day Celebration. During the day the open shop was where blacksmith Eli stressed the importance of the blacksmith to the community of the time and demonstrated on the forge the making of various utilitarian period items.
