Now that we are in the second quarter of a new year, it is appropriate to share the continued accomplishments and future happenings of the Greater Dover Historical Society since the last newsletter.

A new member was installed on the Board of Directors — we welcome Judy Worley and the Board of Directors for their efforts in the past year.

The Blacksmith Shop had its first Open House on April 9 and, as in previous years, the Shop will be open the second Saturday of each month through October. During the Open House events, the Society will have its fundraising items for sale: trash bags, <u>A Century of Reflection</u> books, Blacksmith Shop replicas, and Bloodroot books.

At our April meeting, Cindy Snyder gave a presentation of her 'antique kitchen gadgets' which primarily consisted of her collection of tin ware although her complete collection includes many gadgets other than tin ware. It was a challenge for most of us trying to guess the purpose of each 'gadget' admittedly most of our guesses were wrong. The presentation by Cindy was an interactive one and that made it even more enjoyable.

On June 16, our Deputy Fire Chief of the Dover Township Volunteer Fire Department will speak to our members on Fire Safety in our homes. This topic is relevant to both younger and older Society members. The date will be advertised in our local newspaper and will be open to members and the public.

I've made arrangements with the PA Attorney General's Office to give a presentation on scams and fraud. The date for this is August 18 and the meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. This date will also be advertised in our local newspaper and will be open to all.

The Annual Historical Walk will be held on Tuesday, June 21. This walk begins and ends at the Blacksmith Shop on Butter Rd.

COBBLERS, COACHES, CARPENTERS and CABINET MAKERS By Jo Ott

The previous GDHS newsletter included a narration on some of the blacksmiths, butchers and brickyards operating in the mid-19th century in the Dover area and who were the families that operated them. The information was found in the 1860 edition of *Boyd's Business Directory of the Counties of Adams, Buck, Chester, Cumberland, Dauphin, Delaware, Franklin, Lancaster, Montgomery and York, PA*. Additional family information was taken from the 1860 U. S. Census in amazon.com.

In this newsletter, I'll look at other businesses operating during the same period and who were the families that operated them. How many ancestors' names can you find?

Scanning through the 1860 Census records for Dover Borough and Dover Township yields information on several additional families in each of the above categories not listed in my original source, the *Boyd's Directory*. Limited space in the newsletter prevents exploring all of those families. You are encouraged to research ancestry.com for further information.

The following residents are listed in *Boyd's* as sawmill operators: Peter Boyer; John Crone; Henry Darme; George Emig and Daniel Hoffeins. All, however, are enumerated in the 1860 Census as farmers.

Other Dover area residents were employed as coopers, millers and blacksmiths; as merchants, machinists, weavers and masons; in distilling, pupils of teaching and even a rag dealer. After scanning more than fifty pages of the 1860 Census, I found no Dover area resident enumerated as a sawmill owner or operator. It could be the farmer considered the sawmill operation secondary to the farm operation or this could be due to the response to questions asked by the Census enumerator.
